5 This question is about Christian charitable and mission work in the wider world. It is the AQA-style 24-mark, five-part question: parts (a) to (d) are worth 12 marks; part (e) is the 12-mark evaluation.

- (a)** State what Christian Aid Week raises money for. (1)
- (b)** Give two ways individual Christians might support the work of a charity like Christian Aid. (2)
- (c)** Explain two reasons why Christian Aid's work is important to Christians. Refer to scripture in your answer. (4)
- (d)** Explain two contrasting Christian views on whether Christians should prioritise helping people overseas or people in their own local community. Refer to a source of wisdom and authority in your answer. (5)
- (e)** Evaluate this statement: 'Supporting international aid charities is more important than evangelism for the Church today.' In your answer you should: refer to Christian teaching, refer to different points of view, reach a justified conclusion. (12)

Question 1

- (a) **B1** being sent out to spread the Christian message/gospel, oe
- (a) **Answer: Being sent out to spread the Christian message (the gospel).**
- (b) **B1** actively sharing the Christian gospel with others in order to convert or strengthen their faith, oe
- (b) **Answer: Actively sharing the Christian gospel with others in order to convert or strengthen their faith.**
- (c) **B1** an increase in the number of people belonging to and attending a church, oe
- (c) **Answer: An increase in the number of people belonging to and attending a church.**
- (d) **B1** e.g. Christian Aid / Tearfund / CAFOD, oe
- (d) **Answer: E.g. Christian Aid (or Tearfund, or CAFOD).**
- (e) **B1** Jesus's instruction to his disciples to go and make disciples of all nations, oe
- (e) **Answer: Jesus's instruction to his disciples to go and make disciples of all nations.**

Question 2

- **B1** sending missionaries overseas, oe
- **B1** running evangelistic events/courses at home, e.g. Alpha, oe
- **B1** supporting international aid and development projects (or using media to spread the Christian message), oe
- **Answer: Any three: sending missionaries overseas; running evangelistic events/courses, e.g. Alpha; supporting international aid and development projects; using media to spread the message.**

Question 3

- **B1** point 1: Jesus directly commanded his disciples to spread the gospel to all nations, oe
- **B1** development: Matthew 28:19-20, the Great Commission, 'go and make disciples of all nations... teaching them to obey everything I have commanded', oe
- **B1** point 2: many Christians believe sharing their faith can bring others to salvation, which they consider the most important gift they can offer, oe
- **B1** development: this reflects the belief, based on John 3:16, that faith in Jesus brings eternal life, oe
- **Answer: E.g. obedience to the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20); the belief that sharing faith can lead others to salvation (John 3:16).**

Question 4

- **B1** belief 1: some Christians believe mission should focus on direct evangelism, actively preaching and inviting people to believe in Jesus, oe
- **B1** development: based on Romans 10:14, 'how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them?', oe
- **B1** belief 2: other Christians believe mission is better carried out through practical service and example, showing Christian love through action such as aid and development work, oe
- **B1** development: based on James 2:17, 'faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead', used to support acting out the faith rather than only preaching it, oe
- **B1** reference to a source of wisdom and authority made accurately, oe
- **Answer: Contrast: mission through direct evangelism/preaching (Romans 10:14) vs mission through practical service and example (James 2:17).**

Question 5

- (a) **B1** to support people living in poverty around the world, oe
- **(a) Answer: To support people living in poverty around the world.**
- (b) **B1** donating money, oe
- (b) **B1** volunteering time (or taking part in a sponsored fundraising event, or praying for the charity's work), oe
- **(b) Answer: E.g. donating money, and volunteering time.**
- (c) **B1** point 1: it helps to relieve poverty and suffering around the world, putting Jesus's teaching to help those in need into action, oe
- (c) **B1** development: Matthew 25:40, 'whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me', oe
- (c) **B1** point 2: it reflects the Christian belief in stewardship and generosity, that those who are relatively wealthy have a duty to share with those in greater need, oe
- (c) **B1** development: 2 Corinthians 9:7 teaches that 'God loves a cheerful giver', encouraging generous giving, oe
- **(c) Answer: E.g. putting Jesus's teaching into action (Matthew 25:40); Christian stewardship and generosity (2 Corinthians 9:7).**
- (d) **B1** belief 1: some Christians believe helping people overseas should be a high priority, since suffering and poverty can be far greater in other parts of the world and the Christian message is for all nations, oe
- (d) **B1** development: based on the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19), which calls Christians to reach out beyond their own community, oe
- (d) **B1** belief 2: other Christians believe charity should begin closer to home, prioritising the local community first, oe
- (d) **B1** development: based on Galatians 6:10, 'as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers', which some interpret as prioritising those nearby, oe
- (d) **B1** reference to a source of wisdom and authority made accurately, oe
- **(d) Answer: Contrast: overseas mission prioritised as the Church's call to 'all nations' (Matthew 28:19) vs the local community prioritised first (Galatians 6:10).**
- (e) **L4** (10-12): A well-argued, balanced answer that considers more than one point of view in a developed way, using accurate and detailed references to Christian teaching and/or scripture to support each point, and reaches a clear, justified conclusion.
- (e) **L3** (7-9): A clear and reasoned answer that considers more than one point of view, supported by relevant references to Christian teaching and/or scripture, though the justification of the conclusion may be less developed.
- (e) **L2** (4-6): A reasoned answer that considers at least one point of view, with some relevant supporting evidence, but with limited or no consideration of an alternative view.
- (e) **L1** (1-3): One or more relevant points are made, but with little or no supporting evidence and no reasoned conclusion.
- (e) **L0** (0): No relevant content.
- **(e) Indicative content:**
 - Agree: practical aid meets urgent physical needs, e.g. food, clean water, medical care, that cannot wait, reflecting Jesus's teaching to care for 'the least of these' (Matthew 25:40).
 - Agree: some Christians believe actions speak louder than words, and that generous, practical love is itself a powerful form of Christian witness.
 - Agree: international poverty and disaster affect huge numbers of people, so charities like Christian Aid can be argued to have an urgent, large-scale impact.
 - Disagree: the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20) directly commands making disciples and teaching the faith, not only providing aid, so many Christians see evangelism as the Church's central task.
 - Disagree: without evangelism, future generations may not come to faith at all, which many Christians consider a more serious and lasting loss than physical hardship, however severe.
 - Disagree: many church mission programmes combine aid and evangelism together, e.g. through Christian-run schools, hospitals and development projects, so treating them as being in competition may be a false choice.
 - A balanced conclusion might argue that most Christians see aid and evangelism as complementary parts of the Church's mission rather than one being strictly more important than the other, though individual Christians and denominations vary in how they balance the two priorities.

Question 6

- **B1** point 1: they might give regularly to a mission or aid charity, oe
- **B1** development: e.g. setting up a regular donation to Christian Aid or a similar organisation, oe
- **B1** point 2: they might take part in evangelism themselves, oe
- **B1** development: e.g. inviting a friend to a church event or an evangelistic course such as Alpha, oe
- **Answer: E.g. giving regularly to a mission/aid charity; taking part in evangelism, e.g. inviting a friend to an Alpha course.**

Question 7

- **B1** a Christian Aid Week collection/fundraiser, oe
- **B1** a mission trip, oe
- **B1** hosting an evangelistic course, e.g. Alpha (or a partnership with an overseas church or project), oe
- **Answer: Any three: a Christian Aid Week collection; a mission trip; hosting an evangelistic course, e.g. Alpha; a partnership with an overseas church or project.**
